Variant forms of *a* and other letters applied semi-randomly.

t with flourish at line-end applied with **swsh** (Swash).

Heading 1 style is 16pt with **hist**.

Alternate *r* in *rostro* made with **salt** (Stylistic Alternates).

Alternate capital *H* made with **salt**.

Alternate *n* in *in* made with **salt** and **swsh**.

Alternate *n* of *serena* made with **salt** only. Alternate *P* of *Phoebus* made with **salt**.

Insular *s* (r) of *culus* made with **ss02** (Insular *s*).

Note that **kern** (Kerning), **calt** (Contextual Alternates) and **liga** (Standard Ligatures) should be on at all times. In **MS WORD**, enable them on the “Advanced” tab of the “Font” dialog—preferably as part of the definition of a style.

The abbreviation for *per* (p) is Unicode A751.

The large ampersand is actually a Discretionary Ligature (**dlig**) of *Et*.

This variant of *O* should appear rarely. To make it disappear, turn off Contextual Alternates (**calt**) for the word *Quis*.

Several OpenType features to which MS Word does not provide access are duplicated in Cissanthesmos as Stylistic Sets:

ss09 = Titling Capitals

ss12 = Swash

ss16 = Historical Forms

ss18 = Stylistic Alternates

Pælemon

Alternate *D* of *Dafnis* made with salt.

The abbreviation for *pro* (p) is Unicode A753.

CISSANTHEMOS is a script font based on the hand of the early ninth-century scribe of the Royal Bible, British Library MS Royal 1 E VI. This magnificent but fragmentary manuscript was probably written at the abbey of St Augustine's, Canterbury. At the dissolution of the monasteries during the reign of Henry VIII it came into the hands of John Lumley, first (and only) Baron Lumley, a book collector. After Lumley died childless in 1609, the book passed to the royal family. King George II donated it to the British Museum in 1757.

The script employed by the scribe of the Royal Bible is "insular hybrid minuscule," a formal hand used for important ecclesiastical books. The volume also employs a variety of capitals for several purposes—to begin sentences, for titles, and for what are now called "drop caps." Accordingly, Cissanthemos has three distinct styles of capitals, selectable by OpenType features.

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
