

The Parker Chronicle font is based on the hand of the first scribe of the oldest manuscript of the Anglo-Saxon Chronicle, Corpus Christi College, Cambridge, MS 173, commonly called the “Parker Chronicle” after Archbishop Matthew Parker (1504–1575), its first modern owner. The scribe whose work this font imitates wrote the chronicle’s annals up to the year 892, during the reign of King Alfred the Great.

The font makes as few compromises as possible for the sake of legibility: the lower-case letters *i*, *j*, *q*, *r*, *s*, *w* and *z* have been either introduced or modernized together with a number of capitals and symbols. However, you can restore authentic medieval letter-shapes by turning on the OpenType “historic forms” feature or (in Microsoft Word) “Stylistic Set 16.”

In addition, you should always make sure that “Contextual Alternates” and “Standard Ligatures” are turned on when using this font. Working together, these features automatically vary the shapes of letters, producing an irregular, hand-made look. In Microsoft Word, these and other OpenType features are found on the “Advanced” tab of the “Font” dialog.

There’s not a lot more to it. There are a few “swash” letters, which you can access with either the “Swash” feature or “Stylistic Set 17”: *e* *f* *l* *p* / *t* *b*. Use these to accent the end of a word or sentence. Some alternative letter-forms can be accessed with “Stylistic Alternates” or “Stylistic Set 18”: *d* *d* *C* *c* *D* *d* *E* *e* *F* *sh* *J* *l* *m* *n* *O* *p* *p* *r* *r* *S* *T* *P* *p*. “Stylistic Set 19” changes the standard hyphen to a double-hyphen, and “Stylistic Set 20” turns on just *the Capitals from the Stylistic Alternates set*. These are especially suitable for use in text (normal capitals are better for titles and headings). A few ligatures, in addition to the standard ones, are available as “historic ligatures”: *ȝ* *ȝ* or, and, together with the “Swash” feature, *ov*.

Parke Chronicle can position any of its diacritics over any letters, including the components of ligatures. For example, an **e** with acute followed by an **n** should ligature correctly: **éñ**. Similarly, a **t** followed by an **a** with macron: **á̄t̄**. This feature does not work in all applications. In Adobe InDesign, for example, characters with diacritics will not form ligatures. But in the most widely used applications, including Microsoft Word, diacritics should be correctly positioned over ligatured characters.
